t's a great pleasure to welcome you to our latest edition of Life magazine. In these pages you will find updates from teams across our services, some wonderfully inspiring stories, and the first look at a very special new fundraising event coming in March! You'll also find details about our incredibly special Christmas Appeal and how you can get involved.

As we approach the end of our current Strategy, "Adapting to a Changing World", we have been reflecting on all that has been achieved and the changes implemented. We accomplished a shift in care to a more community based model. supporting individuals and families in their own homes or places of residence whilst still maintaining vital inpatient services. This was a key objective identified in "Adapting to a Changing World". COVID-19 presented significant challenges to our patients, families and Hospice team, but also increased the pace of

change in terms of delivering care and support at home and in the community. Overall referrals to all our clinical services have risen when compared with last year by over 40% and alongside this our inpatient care has increased when compared to the previous vear. We are also the first Hospice in Scotland to implement a virtual palliative care ward. something that has been a crucial link in enabling some of the individuals we support to stay at





home for as long as possible, and to die at home when the time comes.

As the days get shorter and the colder weather starts to set in we are focussing on gathering feedback for our new strategy. We are speaking with staff. volunteers, supporters, health professionals and our wider community to pull together as many ideas and thoughts as possible around what our Hospice care should look like. Much has been achieved since we launched "Adapting to a Changing World" but nothing stands still and we must continue to seek out the best ways to ensure that our diverse community has access to the care and support they need, when they need it most.

The last few months have been busy at the Hospice. Some of the highlights have included the launch of a refreshed website. the filming of new videos to explain our services, an arts team who have been busy planning for our international arts symposium, as well as increasing levels of support for families across our community, and in the Hospice itself. We've also been looking a little further ahead to our 50th anniversary, which although still three years away will no doubt come around quickly! What remains the same however is the incredible team who dedicate their time, skill and expertise to ensuring that the families we care for receive the support they

need. This team is made up of staff, volunteers, supporters, and our wider community, and will always be at the heart of our services. Whatever your interaction with the Hospice may be, thank you for making our services what they are.

On pages 11-12 you will find details about our 2023 Light up a Life appeal. Mandy Murray from our Hospice at Home team explains why the appeal is so important, and why the services we've extended in our community mean so much to those who need it.

I hope you enjoy this edition of the magazine, and that you have a wonderful festive period when it comes.

# Education at St Columba's

Next door to the main Hospice building you'll find N°17, which was formerly known as the Education Centre. Home to a library, offices for our research and education teams, and our unique event spaces.

As a University Hospice, we have a longstanding partnership with Queen Margaret University, and alongside them we deliver a Masters in Person Centred Practice (Palliative Care) and a Postgraduate Certificate in Palliative Care. These courses provide a valuable opportunity for staff from the Hospice to expand their knowledge, and progress

their careers, and the course now boasts numerous Hospice staff amongst its alumni. IPU Lead Sally Ramage and Charge Nurse Rois Porter are currently enrolled on the Masters programme and are grateful for the opportunity to study so close to home.

We asked them a few questions to get their thoughts...



#### Do you think that being able to study at the Hospice whilst working here makes a difference to your engagement with the course?

Sally: It definitely makes a difference to my engagement with the course as I can see the impact my post graduate study has on my practice and I am able to share this knowledge with my team.

#### How important is it that Hospice staff have access to these kind of educational resources and opportunities?

Rois: It's vital to have access to educational resources and opportunities as palliative care is complex and furthering knowledge in the specialty allows us to give the best care possible to our patients and their relatives.

#### What difference has studying the Masters at the Hospice made in your day to day approach? (Aside from just being super busy!)

Sally: Studying the masters has made a massive difference in my day to day approach, it has given me more confidence in my knowledge and allows me to share that knowledge with my colleagues.

### Meet the Team!



 Hi Jade, thanks for taking the time out to answer a few questions.
 Can you tell us a little about yourself?

Hey! I'm Jade, I'm 24, and I've been working at the Hospice full time since August 2022. I have a black belt in Tae Kwon Do and in my spare time I love walking my cava-chon dog, Penny! I also volunteer every summer to take a group of elderly people to Lourdes!

This month for our 'Meet the Team' feature we sat down with Jade, our Child and Families Practitioner!

So what brought you to work here at SCHC?

I trained as a midwife and started working in midwifery after graduating in 2020. Almost as soon as I started I noticed that I was more drawn to those who had suffered a loss, such as a miscarriage, and I wanted to do more to provide care to them. I've also always wanted to work with children, and I have a connection with the Hospice after my Dad was a patient here 16 years ago, so when this job came up it ticked all the boxes!

- So through your experience with your Dad, you knew what to expect from a Hospice then?
- Yeah, I remember visiting him every day after school, and I really looked forward to it every time. The nurses and everyone were so lovely, and it was a really happy, positive experience. The staff even arranged for me to have my 8th birthday party in the Hospice with my Dad, which is one of my happiest memories, because I didn't think I'd have that with him

 What's your favourite thing about working at the Hospice?

I love all of it. The people here are so lovely, there's always somebody who's got time to chat, and everyone is here because they want to help other people. It's such a privilege being part of this time with patients and families too, and that they're letting you in to help at such an important time

## AHP Prehab

The care and support we provide at the Hospice is not just about nursing, medical and clinical support but also about a full team of services.

Our small but mighty team of Allied Health Professionals (AHPs), made up of physiotherapists, Occupational Therapists (OTs), a Podiatrist and Therapy Assistants can help people maintain as normal life as they can for as long as possible. Everyone has a goal (big, small and all the ones in between) and the AHP team help people to identify them and use rehabilitation to help achieve them so that the people we support can get

lt often surprises people to hear the word 'rehabilitation' used alongside the word 'palliative' or even 'hospice'. But every day, and at every stage of someone's illness, we help people to set goals, maintain independence, continue or even start hobbies and activities they love and bring them joy. We focus on optimising and maximising abilities and getting the most out of life even when things are



Sometimes rehabilitation is what you might expect – an exercise programme or practicing getting dressed. But we often use fun in what we do – you might find yourself playing bubble tennis, seated football or bowling.

We might help someone continue to feel able get to the shops even though they can get quite breathless. We might help someone else to manage their fatigue so that they are still able to have their shower. We might run an exercise class which not only helps keep muscles in good working order and as strong as possible, but it also involves a bit of socialising and a laugh, and we all know that can often be the best

Louise Steel was diagnosed with anal cancer in February 2021, and after an intensive course of radiotherapy. chemo, and other procedures, she received the all clear.

Naturally, she and her husband Fraser were delighted, and began planning to move permanently to their home in the sun: a villa which the pair built with their own hands in Cyprus...



### A Dream Come

Then came the news in March 2023, just months before the big move, that an MRI scan had found a tumour on Louise's liver. She spent the next 5 months in the Western General Hospital, with doctors trying a range of drugs and antibiotics to try to both slow the progress of the cancer, as well as fight an aggressive infection. The results weren't good, with Louise unable to sleep, and suffering from vivid hallucinations. When her doctor suggested a move to the Hospice, despite the pain, the sleep deprivation and the hallucinations. Louise refused.

"I didn't know what a Hospice was really all about, I thought you just came here for the end, and I wasn't ready for that" she said.

Two weeks later though, and after further deterioration, Louise felt the time was right.

"I said to the doctor that I didn't think I had long left. and I thought I should maybe head to the Hospice".

When she arrived at Boswall Road to begin her stay as an inpatient, Louise and Fraser both expected the worst, with some family members already having voiced that they thought they might not see her again. With the agreement of her oncologist. Louise had

even resigned herself to the heart-breaking conclusion that she'd be unable to see her youngest son Martin get married in a few weeks' time.

Happily though, her condition stabilised. she was able to get some sleep, and day by day Louise regained some strenath. Seeina this change, the couple redoubled their efforts to get Louise to the wedding and they began making plans with her care team and the family about how this would be possible. Plans were progressing well, but with the wedding in Biggar, and Louise now relying on a



wheelchair to get around, transport remained an issue, or so they thought. Her care team got in touch with Marion, the Patient Transport Vehicle coordinator, who was only too happy to help.

When the big day came, Louise and Fraser travelled in style in the jewel in the Hospice fleet, arriving in time to sit in pride of place at the front of the ceremony. Martin was waiting when she arrived, giving his Mum a corsage, which now takes pride of place in her room in the Hospice. 'I'd have been heartbroken to miss it. I'd have been absolutely crying my eyes out. My goal was to make it to the wedding, and I can't say how thankful I am to have achieved it".

The good news didn't stop there for Louise and Fraser, with their new grandchild being born the day after the wedding and meeting their Grandma soon after! "I was absolutely thrilled to be able to hold them, and I got such a nice surprise when the hospitality team

paid me a visit to drop off a wee shawl they'd knitted for the baby too".

I've never wanted for anything, not since the moment I arrived here" said Louise. "When my mum came to visit on her 88th birthday, the kitchen made her a cake and we were allowed the family in to celebrate. Honestly, the staff, they think of everything. Sometimes you run out of words to describe what a difference they make".
